(a) 'open space' definition - Any comments?:

Green spaces can and do provide recreational function, an amenity function, or aesthetic value to the public but they can also, importantly, support natural ecosystems and are of value because of that too. The definition would be more complete by acknowledging green space as space for nature as well as space for people to access nature. With this in mind the list of areas that qualify as green space should include more remote and rural green space in addition to urban green space. We question whether open, upland as well as wild coastal areas should be included in the list as these are valued recreational areas, fulfil and amenity and an aesthetic function for people in Scotland as well as important spaces for nature.
(c) 'green infrastructure' definition - Any comments?:
Overall agree but suggest add in wording about people and nature e.g. 'connected areas of green infrastructure and open space for people and nature, that together form an integrated and multi-functional network.'
(d) 'green networks' definition - Any comments?:
Overall agree. Care needs to be taken that this definition fits with a definition for Nature Networks that is provided in the NPF4 draft. Arguably, we need both green networks and nature networks (which the draft NPF4 has). We also need to acknowledge the overlap in reality and in policy. Ideally all green spaces would function for people and nature. A green network would be no exception to that general principle.

It is not clear whether wilder open space (within the definition of 'open space' provided) has been captured by the list of types. To make this clearer, the list could refer to 'wild places' or it could reference habitats associated with a spectrum of wild places, which could be within the open space definition. Examples could include moorland, peatlands, heathland, wetlands.

Given the biodiversity crisis and the extent to which we have lost nature from open spaces, we suggest that guidance on Regulation 4(5) encourages Local Authorities to identify how open spaces are functioning for nature. This will vary depending on the habitats present, the soil type, the proximity to sites designated for nature and the species that use or live in the space. It may also reveal that an open space is not functioning for nature. Formally identifying that a space is not functioning for nature presents an opportunity to consider how the space could function for nature.

There is a need to emphasis the opportunities to enhance biodiversity in play and recreation spaces. This is a way to maximise outcomes for wild places and people. Enhancing biodiversity in play and recreation areas will enhance children and young peoples' connection with nature, promote health and wellbeing and enable them to take an active part in caring for their local environment.
