Happenings at Glenlude



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2023: a year to reflect and plan for the next 10 years

Glenlude Manager Karen Purvis shares a summary of some of the many highlights and happenings of the past 12 months at Glenlude.

Volunteer work parties

Re-starting in March, after a break over the colder months, we only managed a small number of Thursday work parties this year. Regardless, 22 of our core volunteers gave over 50 days conservation work keeping up with essential tasks and further tree planting. We continue to remove shelters from now established broadleaf trees and our work to plant native trees in what were formerly larch plantations.

SRUC, volunteers returned once again and carried out a breeding bird survey in May with the Oatridge College Countryside Stewards (ORCS).

After my leave of absence during the summer months, our Engagement Manager Hannah Shaw helped organise a special work party to welcome back our regular Glenlude conservation volunteers. We were delighted with the turnout for this event with 16 volunteers (including three from John Muir Trust Corporate Members **Absolute Escapes**) gathering at the hut along with Trust staff. Tree planting, weeding, grass cutting, ditch clearing and pruning were just some of the activities we carried out on a gloriously sunny day.

A our final work party of 2023 took place on Thursday 14 December. Volunteers continued planting trees and undertook various tidying jobs around the hut and in the tree nursery, packing things away for the colder months and getting prepared for furture work parties

A festive lunch in the hut followed by a fun quiz by the Trust's Thirlmere Resilience Project Officer Isaac Johnston, finished the volunteering year off with a smile.

During 2023, 36 volunteers have given us over 90 days of conservation work. We'll be back in March 2024 with the intention of planting more trees and sowing seeds for the next generation of seedlings.

Other news

Glenlude Gathering Shelter

Site work started on our Gathering Shelter. The site has been cleared of timber, mapped out, the foundations dug & reinforcing steel installed. We engaged with a contractor to take care of the first 'pour' of concrete and with help from volunteers if the weather allows hope to have the second stage finished in the spring. Once completed we will start on the structural build.

Located within our tree nursery enclosure this versitile, multi-purpose outdoor space will enable us to engage with a more diverse range of groups, abilities and faiths. And also to upskill our volunteers so that we can make the best possible use of our own home grown timber for cladding and roofing shingles.

Rewilding Britian funding

We were delighted to be awarded funds from the Rewilding Innovation Fund to support our Growing Glenlude project. This will fund a woodland scoping study that will help inform our updated forest plan. Once this forest plan is in place, we will begin planning for the next ten years of restoration, engagement and inclusive volunteering. We have engaged with an environmental consultancy to carry out this study starting in January 2024, with the report expected at the end of July.

Woodland project update

Following the felling of all 10 hectares of larch in 2021, we have continued to replant these areas with a lovely mix of native broadleaved trees and shrubs creating a mosaic of habitats across the site.

Numerous groups including our regular volunteers are helping with this, mainly

concentrating on the areas (5ha) closest to the hut where access is relatively easy. We contracted out the remaining areas towards the south side of the property to a local forestry company, they have just finished planting 5,500 native broadleaved trees & shrubs across three compartments. To minimise our use of plastics, these trees have been planted in biodegradable tree tubes.

We remain committed to working with Phoenix Futures, the Jamie's Wood team and other charities, local schools and colleges and are very much looking forward to welcoming them back in 2024.

Working with partners

In September, we visited **Trees for Life's** new visitor centre and tree nursery at Dundreggan on the shores of Loch Ness and **Cumbria Wildlife Trust's** Gosling Sike plant nursery near Penrith. Staff from both centres were very generous with their knowledge and time and, as well as making new acquaintances, we have been able to feed some of the learnings into our plans for our own tree nursery at Glenlude.

Next steps...

2024 promises to be an exciting time for Glenlude. On completion of the Woodland Scoping Study, we will be working on our revised forest plan which will inform the next 10 years of the project. Our Gathering Shelter remains a key focus and alongside this we will be re-vamping the tree nursery – improving our irrigation system to make it more water efficient and fit for purpose; upgrading and creating all access paths from the hut to the Gathering Shelter and nursery areas and building raised beds with shading to further protect young trees during hot summers.

We intend to restart our Thursday work parties in March and look forward to reconnecting with our partners and volunteers on site again further extending the woodlands that we've been working on over the past 11 years. The Growing Glenlude project will enable us to welcome a more diverse range of groups and individuals, work that we are keen to build on in coming years.

Glenlude is a beautiful, calming location for local schools and community organisations to develop skills and experience the wellbeing benefits of connecting with wild nature as part

of a thriving ecosystem. Keep an eye on our website for opportunities.
