## Shared Rural Network – consequences of 95% 4G geographical coverage target

I am contacting you on behalf of a coalition of community, conservation and outdoor recreation groups regarding the Shared Rural Network (SRN). While we fully support the principle of improving connectivity for rural communities and businesses, we are highly concerned about the deployment of the programme in Scotland's wild and sparsely populated landscapes.

The programme is based on a geographic target, rather than a population need, which fails to distinguish the clusters of settlement and expanses of land where digital connectivity is not essential to meet the policy outcome. We have specific examples where the consequences of the geographical coverage target are resulting in planning applications for masts in areas of Scotland where there are no roads, business premises or local households that would benefit from the increased mobile coverage.

The consequence of the current scattered, unfocused programme rollout is not only a potential under-utilisation of infrastructure and waste of significant public funds, but significant, avoidable, harm to nationally important landscapes, protected areas and irreplaceable habitats such as ancient woodland. We are particularly concerned about applications where new access tracks are being proposed in wild and remote areas, as these will significantly impact the character of the landscape.

We have recently approached Mr Glenn Preston, Director of Ofcom Scotland, to seek an adjustment to the SRN delivery programme. We would also like to appeal to your powers as a Minister to review the geographical coverage target, which appears to be driving applications for masts in areas where there is no demand or community benefit that could justify the significant costs to public finance and to the UK's finest landscapes.

We appreciate how busy your agenda is, but we would like to kindly ask you for the opportunity to discuss this urgent situation in a 30-minute meeting.
